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### MESSAGE FROM THE Township Manager

#### *“Introducing our 2019 Budget”*


On December 12, 2018, the Silver Spring Township Board of Supervisors approved the 2019 Budget. The major goals included in this year’s budget are to continue to improve customer service, drive down costs, enhance efficiencies in all departments, improve the township infrastructure, and deliver a healthy and sustainable community. On behalf of the Silver Spring Township Board of Supervisors, I can report that the mission was a success and was completed without the need for a tax increase.

The 2019 General Fund amounts to \$14.5 million and the Capital Improvement Fund totals \$1,412,689. Growth, continued infrastructure work, rising health care costs and unfunded federal mandates have continued to have an impact on our budget. With that said, we have and will continue to initiate projects that help the Township drive efficiency and reduce costs. The Township implemented a new financial software system in 2018 which has streamlined transactions and continues to help manage our community’s growth by utilizing state of the art technology within the Township. We will continue to implement additional features in 2019 such as document management and a customer service work order system to continue improving efficiencies in all departments. The Comprehensive Plan will be completed in January 2019 and will provide the master plan for land use in our community. This will assist in guiding public policy in terms of transportation, utilities, land use, recreation, and preservation. Both the software and Comprehensive Plan initiatives are being partially funded by grants through a Department of Community and Economic Development Grant.

Township revenue is collected through several different sources including the Earned Income Tax (EIT), which at 2.8 million, represents 20% of the Township’s total revenue. The EIT is projected to increase by 3.7%, which is attributed to residential growth within the Township. Real Estate Tax collected by the tax collector provides our second largest revenue source. The Township mill rate is 1.3045 and is divided between the Township and our two volunteer fire companies, with the Township portion at .659 mills and representing \$1.8 million in revenue.

# PUBLIC WORKS

## Snow Routes

2019 snow plowing routes are available via the Township's website at [www.sstwp.org/833](http://www.sstwp.org/833). Residents without computer access are invited to contact Jessica Baim, Public Works Administrative Assistant at (717) 766-0178, extension 3003 for information. Please note:

- Silver Spring Township maintains approximately 93 miles of roadway, which can take up to 8 hours to clear during a typical 2-4" snowfall event.
- In cases of severe weather, major roads are plowed first, followed by secondary and local roads, and lastly, developments.
- Residents are encouraged to use off street parking during snow events to allow for plow access to the roadways.



## Yard Damage

- Plow routes are inspected within 3 days of snow removal activities, at which point the Township takes note of any damage to yards/sod.
- Sod left in paved areas will be removed within 4 days of snow removal activities; damaged yard areas will be addressed in the spring.
- Residents living on streets without curbs are asked to place reflective markers along the edge of their lawns to help prevent plow damage.

## New Tree Ordinance

For the safety and wellbeing of our residents, the Silver Spring Township Board of Supervisors recently enacted a new tree ordinance in November. Following are a few of the key points.

- Trees, bushes and shrubbery must provide at least 20 feet of clearance above highways, roads, streets and alleyways and at least 8 feet above sidewalks and public walkways.
- Residents have 30 days to correct issues once notified by the Township of a specific concern.
- If no action is taken, Residents face the possibility of a \$500.00, plus \$10.00 per day fine.

We ask residents to please check their property to ensure they follow the new ordinance. Ordinance No. 2018-10 is available via the Township's website at [www.sstwp.org/810/\\_2018](http://www.sstwp.org/810/_2018).

## Revised Septic Ordinance

At the October 24, 2018 meeting, the Board of Supervisors approved revisions to the Township's existing Septic Ordinance. Following are a few of the key changes.

- Residents with on lot sewage systems are required to purchase a pumping permit.
- Pumping permits are \$50.00 and are valid for 60 days from the date of purchase.
- On lot septic systems are required to be pumped at least once every 5 years.

Sewage Enforcement Officer, Gary Morrow, is required to be present at all septic pumpings. His presence ensures that the pumping date will be recorded in the Township's data base which updates records for all parcels.


## MESSAGE FROM THE Township Manager CONTINUED FROM PAGE 1

Silver Spring Township continues to top the charts in growth in the Commonwealth. It is estimated that the Township's growth in the past five years has increased by nearly 20 percent and our focus has and will continue to be safety and infrastructure improvements. The Township will invest over \$500,000 in roadway improvements in 2019. Other major projects in 2019 include Sample Bridge Road reconstruction engineering design, culvert replacement on Sunset Drive, and engineering design for two new traffic signals: Silver Spring Road/Woods Drive and Mulberry Drive/Route 114. In addition, we are anticipating the completion of several Green Light Go Grant projects, including the upgrade of traffic signals with battery backups, new controllers, and LED bulb replacements.

We expect growth in the Township to continue well beyond 2019 and are committed to continue providing our residents with excellent customer service, ensuring that Silver Spring Township remains a beautiful place to live, work and play. # EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT AGENCY (EMA)

## Stay Safe when Winter Storms Threaten

### Prepare & Survive

Know your area's risk for winter storms. Extreme winter weather can leave communities without utilities or other services for long periods of time.

- Pay attention to weather reports and warnings of freezing weather and winter storms.
- Gather supplies, including medications in case you need to stay home for several days without power.
- Create an emergency supply kit for your car and keep the gas tank full.
- Limit your time outside. Watch for signs of frostbite and hypothermia.
- Reduce the risk of a heart attack. Avoid overexertion when shoveling snow.
- Check on neighbors. Older adults and young children are more at risk in extreme cold.



### Recognize & Respond

Learn the signs of, and basic treatments for frostbite and hypothermia, which is an abnormally low body temperature.

- Anything below 95 degrees is an emergency.
- Loss of feeling and color around the face, fingers, and toes.
- Shivering, exhaustion, confusion, fumbling hands, memory loss, slurred speech, or drowsiness.
- Go to a warm room. Keep dry and wrap up in warm blankets, including the head and neck.

## Every Second Counts

Valuable time can be lost if your house number is not clearly posted where emergency responders can see it. This means Police, Fire, and EMS responders cannot provide lifesaving services to you and your family if they cannot find your house.

The Emergency Management Agency recommends the use of standard issue reflective address markers, as shown above. These signs provide a consistent, easily read address for our emergency responders and could save lives by saving time in helping to identify your property.



### Do I really need one of these signs?

Ask yourself, can your house be found easily by a passing car? Can it be found quickly in an emergency? How about at night? Or from a distance, when seconds count?

Try this. Drive or walk up and down your street. Put yourself in the position of a rescuer that's responding to your house in a life-or-death situation. Note whether or not your house number can be seen clearly and easily from the street, especially at night and during bad weather. If you answered no to any of these questions, we recommend you purchase an address sign.

### How do I get one?

911 Address Signs are available through the Township at a cost of \$25.00 by visiting the Township Administration Building, located at 8 Flowers Drive in Mechanicsburg (Monday-Friday from 8:00 am to 4:00 pm).

# COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT

## ***Comprehensive Plan***

Silver Spring Township is rapidly changing due to the ever-increasing population growth and commercial developments.

A new Comprehensive Plan has been drafted to help guide the rapid growth for the next 10 years. The purpose of a Comprehensive Plan is to create a vision and roadmap to help Silver Spring Township make vital decisions about its future.

The Comprehensive Plan has been broken into two separate components. Part A has been created to help the Township incorporate land use and transportation planning efforts for future development. A major theme in Part A is discussing the management of the remaining undeveloped land of Silver Spring Township. Part B consists of years of research that evaluated the existing conditions and collected the public's input regarding a variety of categories.

The Board of Supervisors invites everyone to attend the public hearing on Wednesday, January 23, 2019, at 6:30 pm to provide comments regarding Township's Comprehensive Plan.

## ***Building & Codes***

Residents and business owners are reminded that it is the occupant of the property that is responsible for ensuring that their sidewalks are clear of snow and ice.



Ordinance 2011-10 requires residents to clear a path of at least 36 inches in width within 24 hours of a snow, ice, slush or other such event. If a sidewalk is less than 36 inches, the entire sidewalk

should be cleared. Failure to do so would result in a notice of violation and or citation, which could result in a fine.

Building and Codes would like to remind everyone to please contact the Township office prior to beginning construction to confirm if a building permit is required. By contacting us, you can be confident that you are following the law, and ensuring the safety of your family, your community and yourself. ## ***Planning & Zoning***

Like all zoning ordinances, Silver Spring Township's zoning ordinance aims to promote, protect and facilitate public health, safety and general welfare of the residents. In 2019 the Township will be performing major updates to the Zoning Ordinance once the Comprehensive Plan is fully adopted. The drafting and adoption process can be long, but the end result will help facilitate the vision of the Comprehensive Plan. Funding for the Zoning Ordinance will come from the EIP grant and the Cumberland County Land Partnership Grant. Environmental Planning & Design will be the lead consultant to assist with the update.



## ***Be Stormwater Smart this Winter***

As the winter weather approaches, keep in mind that salt and other materials we use to melt ice and provide traction can runoff into our waterways and contribute to stormwater runoff pollution. Here are a few winter stormwater tips:

- Shovel early! The sooner you shovel, the less likely it is for ice and snow to buildup and you will not need to use as much salt.
- Don't over salt! Salt takes time to work. Extra salt does not increase its effectiveness.
- Read the bag! Certain deicers/salts have less environmental impact. Look for eco-friendly products that contain acetate, potassium chloride or magnesium chloride. Avoid products containing sodium chloride and calcium chloride which are more harmful to vegetation, wildlife and pets.
- Check the temperature! Many deicers don't work in temperatures below 15 degrees Fahrenheit.
- Cracked Corn can be an effective and more environmentally friendly traction agent. Sand and kitty litter may work but can clog up storm drains and contribute to runoff pollution.
- Sweep up excess salt and traction agents before they runoff into our Streams.
